

How many wildflowers can you spot?

All of these flowers can be found in the parkland and garden. You might also see them on a walk close to home! Wildflowers provide nectar – a sugar-rich liquid. It's the fuel that pollinators need to fly. Try counting how many different pollinators you can see today whilst spotting flowers.

Oxeye Daisy

These beautiful large blooms appear from July to September and can be found in meadows, verges and along field edges. It's also known as a 'moon daisy' – with flowers so bright that they appear to 'glow' in the evening.

Yellow Rattle

Known as the meadow-maker's helper because it restricts the growth of grasses. This helps to create a species-rich meadow.

Meadow Buttercup

Can you spot this tall buttercup which grows up to one metre tall? Its dazzling yellow petals shine bright in the sunshine.

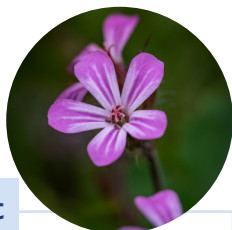

Red Dead-nettle

This is a common plant – look out for its pink-red flowers. It doesn't sting, but often grows within stinging nettle patches to avoid being eaten!

Herb Robert

This tiny pink flower has a reddish stem and likes a shady habitat. You'll find it along the paths in Stand wood.

Germander Speedwell

Look for the two white stamen sprouting from the pale "eye" in the centre of this bright blue flower.

Red Campion

A tall pink wildflower found in grassland. Look for flowers with five deeply notched petals.

Red Clover

These flowers have rounded heads. They are a superfood for bees and are also known as "bee bread".

Common Poppy

These bright red blooms stand out from the crowd – how many can you find?

Tufted Vetch

Tufted Vetch belongs to the pea family. It has long grey leaves. Can you spot its bright violet flowers?
